### Articles and Databases:

Your local public library will most likely be the place where you can access online databases. In most cases you will need a library card from your local library to search the databases.

The Chicago Public Library specifically has electronic databases that index magazines, scholarly journals, newspapers and other periodicals on various topics. The *Chicago Tribune Historical Archive, 1849-1992*, and the current Chicago Tribune database (1985 to the present), and The Chicago Sun Times index, 1986 to the present, are the mainstream newspaper databases for Chicago and Illinois news. The Chicago Defender is the African-American newspaper covering Chicago news of the community. In some places it is a separate index, in others it is part of *Black Newspapers Database*.

*EBSCO Magazines and Journals* is an international index going back to the 1980s.

*ProQuest Newspapers* covers many national and international newspapers back to 1983.

You need a Chicago Public Library card to access these, both in person at a branch library, or online from home. The Library website is [www.chipublib.org](http://www.chipublib.org) for more information.

### **Websites:**

Windycitymediagroup.com: Click on PUBLICATIONS to see a drop down menu, and then click *Windy City Times*. This newspaper is indexed here going back about ten years. It may be searched using key words or exact topics and personal names.

Google: When searching the internet always be aware of the source of the website. For example, if you do a Google search for Gay History, you will see a varied list of sources, some good, some not so good. They can vary from Wikipedia to The Huffington Post to very amateur websites. If you need help, ask a Librarian.

Both of these websites will provide you with a GUIDE to the collections in both of these museums. These are not full-text databases.
